How a shared memory of Fascism and its cultural heritage took shape is still today the most disputed question of modern Italy, crossing the boundaries between academic and public discourse. *Against Redemption* concentrates on the historical period in which disagreement was at its highest: the transition between the downfall of Mussolini in July 1943 and the victory of the Christian Democrats over the Left in the 1948 general elections. By dispelling the silence around the range of opinion in the years before the ideological struggle fossilized into Cold War oppositions, this book points to early postwar literary practices as the main vehicle for intellectual dissent, shedding new light on the role of cultural policies in institutionalizing collective memory. During Italy's transition to democracy, competing narratives over the recent traumatic past emerged and crystallized, depicting the country's break with Mussolini's regime as a political and personal redemption from its politics of exclusion and unrestrained use of violence. Conversely, outstanding authors such as Elsa Morante, Carlo Levi, Alberto Moravia, and Curzio Malaparte, in close dialogue with remarkable but now-neglected figures, stressed the cultural continuity between the new democracy and

Fascism, igniting heated debates from opposite political standpoints. Their works addressed questions such as the working through of national defeat, Italian responsibility in World War II, and the Holocaust, revealing how the social, racial, and gender biases that characterized Fascism survived after its demise and haunted the newborn democracy.

La civiltà occidentale e l'identità europea Erasmo Silvio Storace 2021-07-02T00:00:00+02:00 I due autori di riferimento di questa trattazione, Oswald Spengler e Carl Schmitt, sono quasi contemporanei: Spengler nasce nel 1880, mentre Schmitt nasce nel 1888. Schmitt arriverà però a

vivere quasi cento anni (morirà infatti nel 1985), mentre Spengler morirà molto prima, addirittura nel 1936, ossia senza vedere la Seconda guerra mondiale, che invece sarà fonte di riflessioni importantissime per Schmitt. Si pensi che il primo volume del capolavoro di Spengler, *Il tramonto dell'Occidente*, è stato ultimato prima della fine della Prima guerra mondiale: ciononostante, egli sembra aver maturato risultati analoghi a quelli a cui giungerà Schmitt proprio alla luce dei cambiamenti connessi agli esiti dei due conflitti mondiali (a tal proposito, si farà riferimento soprattutto al suo lavoro del 1950, *Il nomos della terra*). Si potrebbe dunque dire che i due autori partano da alcuni presupposti analoghi, anche a livello cronologico e di formazione: si sono infatti formati negli stessi anni, cioè in quel periodo di profonda crisi descritto da entrambi come l'inizio della fine.

Fascism's European Empire Davide Rodogno 2006-08-03 This 2006 book is a controversial reappraisal of the Italian occupation of the Mediterranean during the Second World War, which Davide Rodogno examines within the framework of fascist imperial ambitions. He focuses on the European territories annexed and occupied by Italy between 1940 and 1943: metropolitan France, Corsica, Slovenia, Croatia, Dalmatia, Montenegro, Albania, Kosovo, Western Macedonia, and mainland and insular Greece. He explores Italy's plans for Mediterranean expansion, its relationship with Germany, economic exploitation, the forced 'Italianisation' of the annexed territories, collaboration, repression, and Italian policies towards refugees and Jews. He also compares Fascist Italy and Nazi Germany through their dreams of imperial conquest, the role of racism and anti-Semitism, and the 'fascistization' of the Italian Army. Based on previously unpublished sources, this is a groundbreaking contribution to genocide, resistance, war crimes and occupation studies as well as to the history of the Second World War more generally.

On the Other Shore John Starosta Galante 2022
On the Other Shore explores the social history of Italian communities in South America and the transnational networks in which they were situated during and after World War I. From 1915 to 1921 Italy's conflict against Austria-Hungary and its aftermath shook Italian immigrants and their children in the metropolitan areas of Buenos Aires, Montevideo, and São Paulo. The war led portions of these communities to mobilize resources—patriotic support, young men who could enlist in the Italian army, goods like wool from Argentina and limes from Brazil, and lots of money—to support Italy in the face of “total war.” Yet other portions of these communities simultaneously organized a strident movement against the war, inspired especially by anarchism and revolutionary socialism. Both of these factions sought to extend their influence and ambitions into the immediate postwar period. *On the Other Shore* demonstrates patterns of social cohesion and division within the Italian communities of South America; reconstructs varying transatlantic and inter-American networks of interaction, exchange, and mobility in an “Italian Atlantic”; interrogates how authorities in Italy viewed their South American “colonies”; and uncovers ways that Italians in Latin America balanced and blended relationships and loyalties to their countries of residence and origin. *On the Other Shore*'s position at the intersection of Latin American history, Atlantic history, and the histories of World War I and Italian immigration thereby engages with and informs each of these subject areas in distinctive ways.
